- New terms and change of language (in some parts)<sup>© Blume Method™</sup>



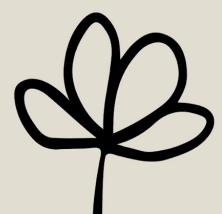

- Sixteen pages

- Four Present Levels pages (no acronyms)
- Transition planning part of the IEP
- Accommodations/modifications on dedicated page
- Baseline (data, data, data)
- Goals with specific requirements
- Participation in general education setting
- Two service delivery grids (school year and ESY)



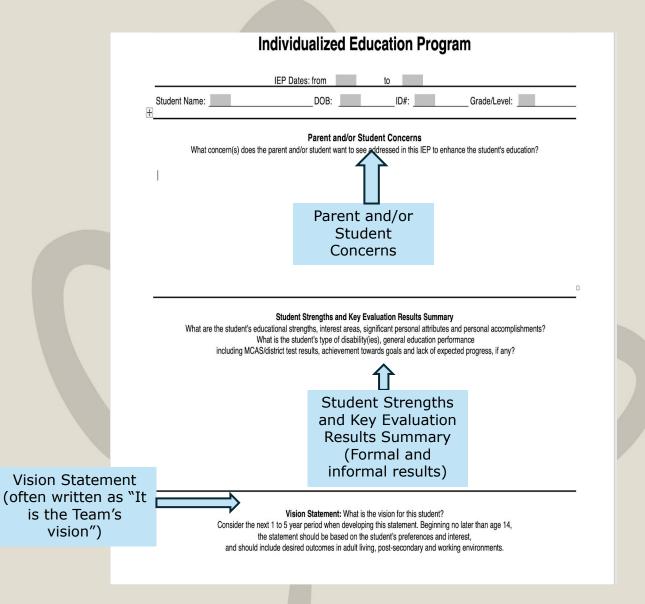

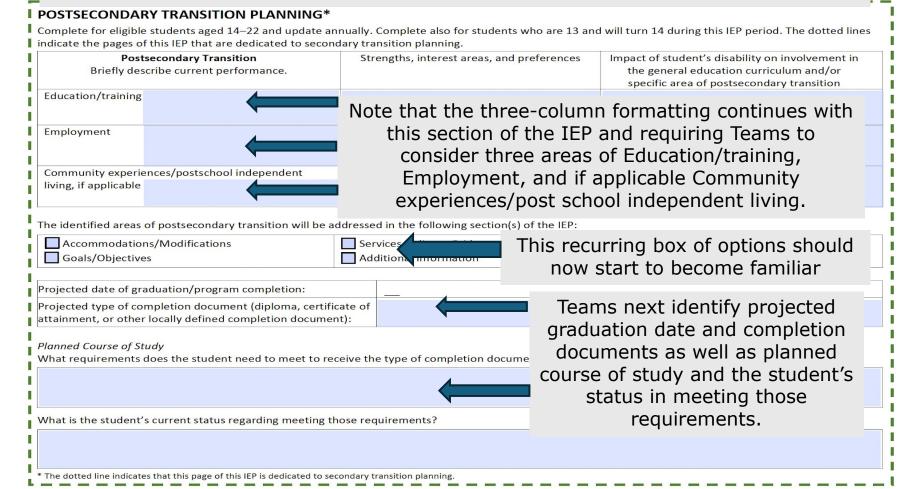

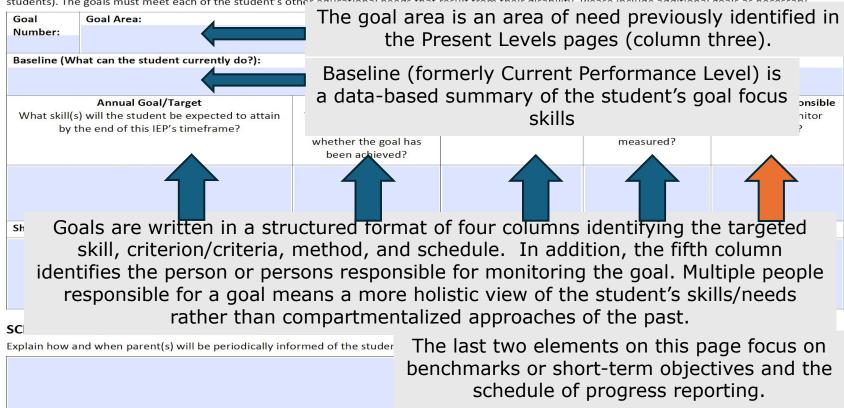

services cannot be achieved satisfactorily." (Emphasis added.)

Another change in this document is that rather than justifying nonparticipation after the service delivery grid, teams should consider participation in the general education setting BEFORE creating the service delivery and then create the grid to reflect those considerations.
